



PLANNING PROCESS GUIDING PRINCIPLES



Implement natural resource and green infrastructure practices to create and manage urban park spaces so they are more resilient to ecological change and disturbance as part of the surrounding and regional community.



Strengthen the relevancy of the Emerald Necklace and Cleveland Metroparks Zoo as the park system enters its second century. Affirm the Park District's role and identity in response to changes in demographics and economics and continue to emphasize conservation education. Support the resurgence of the City of Cleveland and the inner ring suburbs.



Advance connections and trail systems that complete the Emerald Necklace and, in partnership with other agencies and communities, connect with local, state and regional trail networks, communities and places of interest.



Expand and strengthen outdoor experiences and recreation opportunities consistent with the organization's mission, and keep pace with market trends to contribute to the region's attractiveness as a place to live, work and play.



Continue sustainable business practices to support Cleveland Metroparks capital, operations and maintenance needs over the next ten-year levy cycle and beyond.

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


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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

RESERVATION MASTER PLANS

Cleveland Metroparks is an intergral part of Cleveland and Northeast Ohio's regional identity. Founded in 1917, Cleveland Metroparks was the first natural-area park district in Ohio. The system was at the forefront of the national movement to preserve areas of natural beauty for public enjoyment and improved quality of life.



The initiative to protect an "Emerald Necklace" of streams and open spaces connected by a scenic parkway was led by William Stinchcomb. Stinchcomb previously served as Chief Engineer of Parks for the City of Cleveland and had developed plans for a series of parks to complement the 1903 Group Plan. His vision for Cleveland Metroparks expanded the concept to create an outer system of parks and boulevards to improve the quality of life for residents of Cuyahoga County and provide respite from the stresses of urbanization. Today, the Emerald Necklace encompasses 18 reservations and the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo. The parks protect more than 24,000 acres of open space and hosted over 19.4 million recreational visits in 2020.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

Stinchcomb's idea of an Emerald Necklace provided a long-term vision which guides progress to this day. Strategic planning efforts have taken place in 1960,1995, 2012 and 2021. Ongoing strategic plans supplement the vision by prioritizing Park District resources, proactively addressing community needs, and keeping Cleveland Metroparks at the forefront of national best practices.

The most recent plan, Cleveland Metroparks 2020: The Emerald Necklace Centennial Plan was completed in 2012. The plan included master plans for the 16 reservations and the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo. In accordanace with the Commission for Accrediation of Park and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA) best practices, both the strategic plan and master plans for Cleveland Metroparks facilities are updated on an ongoing basis.

2015 STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

The 2012 Strategic Plan directly influences the Park District's actions. Many milestones have been accomplished since the plan was adopted, including:

- The donation of a 155-acre former golf course in December 2012 to create Acacia Reservation, the 17th reservation.
- A long-term lease agreement leading to the creation of the Lakefront Reservation in June 2013, adding 461 acres of lakefront parks new to Cleveland Metroparks (Edgewater Park, E 55th, North Gordon Park, Euclid Beach, Villa Angela, and Wildwood, plus three marinas and five yacht clubs), the 18th reservation.
- The completion and grand opening of the Watershead Stewardship Center at West Creek Reservation.
- Restructuring of several internal departments, including integration of the Zoo and Park District Marketing Departments.

An update to the Emerald Necklace Centennial Plan was prepared in 2015 to document progress, address new trends, and refresh Park District priorities. The update resulted in the consolidation of the original plan's key directions into five strategic goals:



Conserve and protect the environment by restoring native habitat and promoting green infrastructure

Advance trails that connect parks to neighborhoods and to local, state, and ŶŶŶ regional networks

Encourage community interest in parks and the natural world with a range CONNECTIONS of activities, programs, and facilities

RESERVATION MASTER PLAN FRAMEWORK


Reservation Master Plans help translate the Park District's overarching strategic goals into actions at the park level. The approach to updating each individual reservation's 2012 plan is to develop an overall vision for each park. Guiding principles are then indentified based how the reservation can best reflect the five strategic goals of the Park District. Proposed actions correlate to the strategic goals. This approach helps park guests, employees, and the overall community connect the day-to-day efforts of Cleveland Metroparks with the Park District's longterm initiatives.

Reservation Plans are updated on a rolling schedule, with the most recent plans completed prior to the current update of the Strategic Plan. The mission and goals reflect the mission and goals in place at the time of the planning process. Planning efforts include developing the initial plans for two reservations added since 2012, along with the growth of existing parks.


Cleveland Metroparks planning efforts involve stakeholders representing all the facets of the park, including education staff, recreation staff, park managers, natural resource managers, marketing and event staff, planning and design staff, and land protection managers. Conceptual plans are developed and evaluated by these in-house experts and are presented for public feedback online and in Open Houses. Final reservation master plans provide guidance for ongoing capital investments, land and resource protection efforts, and park management activities.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES



Cleveland Metroparks will accomplish habitat restoration projects to fulfill the potential of Acacia Reservation, protecting and enhancing of the largest remaining open space areas in the Euclid Creek Watershed.



Acacia Reservation will provide programs and serve as living lab for education and hands-on exploration by area groups, with a focus on urban streams and habitat restoration principles. Park activities and facilities will strive to engage guests with diverse backgrounds and provide opportunities to enjoy health and wellness, social interaction, and educational programs.




Acacia Reservation will serve as a hub for low impact recreation in a natural setting, with eventual connections to neighborhoods, Euclid Creek Reservation, and regional trails as opportunities allow.



Acacia Reservation will be a natural oasis in the midst of a busy city providing trails, gathering spaces, visitor amenities, and natural areas.



Park ammenities will enrich guest exeriences and connect people with the natural environment, while following Cleveland Metropark's internal guidelines for sustainable development and operations.



RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

A commitment to conserving one of the largest undeveloped parcels inside the I-271 corridor led to the creation of Acacia Reservation. The park surrounds the upper reach of Euclid Creek. Formerly a private golf club, Acacia was purchased in 2012 then donated to Cleveland Metroparks with the stipulation that the property be returned to a natural state. Visitors enjoy the trails and picnic areas surrounded by streams, meadows, and forests reverting to a natural state.



GUIDING PRINCIPLES



Maintain high ratio of natural areas to developed areas. Pursue protection of adjacent fragile areas, such as floodplains, steep slopes, and stream channels, where development would negatively impact park resources.



Continue the success of sustainable trail enhancements, improve community connections, and assess options to further integrate Shawnee Hills Golf Course with park offerings and landscapes.




Strengthen wayfinding and connectivity of the Emerald Necklace, particularly the Parkway and trail connections to Brecksville and South Chagrin, as well as to Cuyahoga Valley National Park, the Towpath, and Summit County Bike Hike Trail. Improve bike and pedestrian access from ajacent neighboroods.



Expand opportunities for users. Maximize the feeling of sanctuary and retreat for park guests while capitalizing on nearby regional attractions and recent acquisitions.



Address aging park infrastructure with historically appropriate repairs. Study stream restoration needs and pursue funding. Work with partners to reduce urbanization impacts.



RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Bedford Reservation protects Tinkers Creek and its forested valleys as it courses through Bedford and surrounding communities. Tinkers Creek Gorge is one of the most scenic sections of the park. The 220 foot deep gorge was designated as a National Natural Landmark in 1968. Bedford Reservation lies within the boundaries of the Cuyahoga Valley National Park (CVNP). Bedford Reservation contains nearly seven miles of parkway as part of the Emerald Necklace. Park trails link Bedford Reservation to the Summit Metro Park Bike & Hike Trail to provide an off-road route to CVNP, the Towpath Trail, and points beyond.





This reservation features a deep gorge -- declared a National Natural Landmark -- carved out by Tinker's Creek, with picturesque vistas and waterfalls. Mature trees and abundant wildflowers are found within its deep forests. It offers trails for hiking, mountain biking and horseback riding, as well as picnic areas and Shawnee Hills Golf Course. At over 2,200 acres, Bedford *Reservation gives the appearance of a continuous forest of large* trees as it was not logged due to its rugged terrain. Tinker's Creek, the largest tributary of the Cuyahoga River. A scenic overlook along *Gorge Parkway offers a spectacular vista, particularly in the fall.*



RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Big Creek Reservation serves primarily as an urban greenway which winds along Big Creek through the southwest suburbs of Cuyahoga County. Many areas of this reservation are surrounded by urbanized areas, limiting opportunities to create new or expanded facilities. Various options for linking Big Creek Reservation with Memphis Picnic Area and Brookside Reservation/Cleveland Metroparks Zoo are appealing to surrounding communities. Flooding along the creek is an issue and partnerships can be sought to mitigate impacts of development and protect natural resources.



- North connections consider additional land protection to create a trail link from the Lake to Lake Trail north, eventually connecting to Rocky River Reservation





INITIAL PRIORITIES

1. Trail and neighborhood connections

- Memphis to Brookpark link work with partners to protect the stream corridor and floodplain to reduce flooding impacts and create trail linkages
- Baldwin Creek consider trail connections to Sprague / Beyer's Pond
- 2. Fern Hill picnic area educate to reduce wildlife feeding






RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Bradley Woods Reservation has a high resource value due to its location atop a massive formation of Berea Sandstone, which can be seen in old quarry sites within the reservation. It is also one of the few remaining examples of swamp forest within Cuyahoga County, with large tracts of relatively undisturbed woodlands.



The reservation is filled with deep forests* of red maples, sour gums, tupelos, yellow birches, and pin oaks. Bunns Lake, dedicated in 1986, was created to provide waterfowl habitat, and serve as a pleasant spot for nature lovers.







RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Brecksville Reservation is one of the original parks of the Cleveland Metroparks system. The park protects seven streams, including Chippewa Creek. The streams follow deep gorges carved by retreating glaciers and link upland forested areas to the broad Cuyahoga River Valley. The park has a wide variety of soil and sunlight conditions, fostering the growth of rare, unusual and endangered plants. Features include Deer Lick Cave, the Harriet Keeler Memorial, two golf courses, the Brecksville Nature Center, and a network of nature trails and all-purpose trails. The park is adjacent to the Towpath Trail and Cuyahoga Valley National Park.







RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

The city of Cleveland purchased a portion of the Big Creek Valley to create Brookside Park in 1894. The park was part of the city-wide effort to create a park in each of seven main sections, connected by a boulevard system. Cleveland's zoo moved to Brookside from its original location in Wade Park in 1907. In addition to the zoo, Brookside was developed with ballfields, picnic facilities, and walking paths.

In 1957, the Cleveland Zoological Society assumed control of the zoo. In 1968, the City of Cleveland transferred ownership of the zoo to the Cleveland Metroparks. The Cleveland Zoological Society transferred management of the zoo to Cleveland Metroparks in 1975. The zoo currently features thousands of animals representing 600 species from around the world and is designed as a botanical garden demonstrating the relationship between plants and people.

Management of Brookside Reservation was transferred to Cleveland Metroparks in 1993. The park continues to provide ballfields, picnic facilities, and all purpose trails while protecting forested bluffs along the Big Creek Valley.






RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Euclid Creek carves a deep gorge as it travels from the highlands of eastern Cuyahoga County to the lower plains along Lake Erie. The reservation offers shady trails and picnic areas near the creek, surrounded by steep forested hillsides and rocky cliffs. The cliffs display the geologic underpinnings of Cleveland's east side, including bluestone, which was quarried onsite. Less than two miles to the north, Euclid Creek traverses a broad riparian zone as it flows through Wildwood Park to meet Lake Erie. The lakefront portion of the park includes Wildwood, Villa Angela, and Euclid Beach. These areas provide boating access, picnicing, fishing, and 1700 feet of sandy beach for the public to enjoy.

RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Garfield Park originally opened in 1895 as Newburg Park and much of the original stonework is still evident today. The primary resource of the park is its aesthetic character and artistic design, which serves as an example of European park influence. The initial landscape plan was drafted by Boston architect Ernest W. Bowditch in a romantic European style that mimicked the designs of Frederick Law Olmstead. The popular park thrived through mid-1900s, but suffered from a lack of maintenance and investment by the 1980s. Cleveland Metroparks secured a 99-year lease from the City of Cleveland in 1986 and took on operation of the park.

Garfield Park Reservation is a popular destination for fitness and for family gatherings. A scenic forested valley is the core of the reservation. The park's all purpose trail extends to Mill Creek Falls to the north, Cuyahoga County's highest waterfall. Continued investment and programming can better activate the park and invite the community to fully explore this historic park.

RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Hinckley Reservation features opportunities for fishing, kayaking, swimming, and other water-based recreation at Hinckley Lake. The 90-acre lake is the focal point of a park known for unique geologic, hydrologic, and cultural features. Whipp's Ledges were formed more than 250 million years ago and are a popular destination for hikers and rock climbers. Worden's Ledges, a similar feature, include stone carvings of a variety of figures dating back to the late 1800's. Hinckley Reservation conserves high quality habitat along the East Branch of the Rocky River and is noted internationally for the return of the buzzards every March 15th.

RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Huntington Reservation surrounds Porter Creek as it flows to meet Lake Erie. The park's public beach, wooded valley, trails, and picnic areas have some of the highest visitation volumes in the Park District. Remnants of the site's rich history include an historic water tower from the site's use as a vineyard and support columns from the former Interurban electric rail line. The main park shelter dates to the 1930s and was constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps. The park is home to two affiliate organizations, BAYarts and Lake Erie Nature and Science Center, and is adjacent to Bay Village's 116-acre Cahoon Memorial Park.





RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Cleveland Metroparks' Lakefront Reservation was established in 2013. The reservation's 465 acres encompass multiple park areas along Lake Erie. Edgewater Park and Gordon Park date to the 1890s, when they were created as City of Cleveland parks; other park areas were built as part of the construction of Interstate 90. The parks were managed by the City of Cleveland, then as State Parks, until the 2013 lease agreement with Cleveland Metroparks. Wendy Park was added to Lakefront Reservation in 2014.

The parks are popular for picnicking, boating, swimming, fishing, birdwatching, and special events. The Cleveland Lakefront Bikeway connects most of the parks along the lakefront. Edgewater Park, Wendy Park, East 55th Street Marina, East 72nd Street Fishing Area, and North Gordon Park all offer outstanding opportunities to view and experience Lake Erie. Specific attributes are included in the individual area descriptions.

Planning for Euclid Creek Reservation – Lakefront planning occurred in conjunction with Lakefront Reservation due to site similarities. The plans are included in this section.

RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Edgewater Park offers a large swimming beach, a fishing pier, a forested bluff, picnicking, and several large lawn areas. The Edgewater Beach House includes restrooms, changing areas, seasonal concessions, and an open-air upper level with a fireplace, seating areas, and a bar. Trails include 1.5 miles of the Cleveland Lakefront Bikeway, connections linking Edgewater to the adjacent neighborhood, and paved loop trails. The historic Upper Edgewater Shelter is available for picnicking and rentals. A public boat launch and private yacht club and marina provide access for boating on Lake Erie.










RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

East 55th Street Marina and Fishing Area provides dramatic views to Lake Erie and Downtown Cleveland. The 1,200-foot fishing platform is popular with anglers. A seasonal waterfront restaurant, bar, patio, sand volleyball, bocce ball, and picnic areas with grills provide great spots to enjoy the lakefront atmosphere. Additional services at the park include courtesy docks, a fuel dock, bait shop, snack bar, marina store, and a gated 352-slip seasonal marina operated by Cleveland Metroparks. The Cleveland Lakefront Bikeway travels through the park and links it to East 55th Street to the west and East 72nd Fishing Area, North Gordon Park, and the Harrison Dillard Trail in Rockefeller Park to the east.

East 55th, East 72nd and North Gordon Park border the north side of Interstate 90 and are connected by the Cleveland Lakefront Bikeway. Amenities include restrooms, fishing platforms along the lake, a public boat ramp, and picnic areas with grills. The eastern-most park entrance along Lakeshore Boulevard provides parking and access to the adjacent Cleveland Lakefront Nature Preserve.









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

Euclid Beach, Villa Angela, and Wildwood were added to Euclid Creek Reservation in 2013. These areas are grouped with Lakefront Reservation for planning purposes since they share attributes with other lakefront parks. The lakefront portion of Euclid Creek Reservation provides trails, picnic areas overlooking Lake Erie, a pier, shelters, a swimming beach, restrooms, seasonal concessions, fishing areas, paddle access, and a public boat launch. Lakefront habitat includes an oxbow wetland, the confluence of Euclid Creek with Lake Erie, and wooded areas and meadows. The three areas are connected by the Cleveland Lakefront Bikeway.



Williams Memorial Woods, a climax forest listed on the Natural Register of Historic Areas. 

RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

The Ohio & Erie Canal Reservation features the northernmost remaining watered portion of the 309-mile Ohio and Erie Canal, which was built over an eight year period from 1824 to 1832. The Reservation was created on the backlands of industrial properties which abut the Cuyahoga River and the Canal. The Reservation lies within the Ohio and Erie Canalway National Heritage Corridor and includes the Towpath Trail, which winds through the Reservation and will eventually link the Cuyahoga Valley National Park with Lake Erie.

RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Long and narrow, Rocky River Reservation follows the sinuous course of the Rocky River from Berea northward into Lakewood near Lake Erie. The reservation is strongly influenced by the massive shale cliffs of the valley. Since the reservation is primarily surrounded by dense urban development, it serves as a green respite to many residents of the area. In recent years, all purpose connectors have been constructed from nearby neighborhoods to link with the Valley Parkway Trail.


Breathtaking rock formations, a majestic meandering river, crystal clear streams and waterfalls, and a landscape dotted with reminders of the Valley's history: South Chagrin Reservation offers the visitor a haven for meditation and wonder. Unique soil supports the abundant growth of Black Birch throughout the forest. Sulphur Springs and its cold water tributaries form the centerpeice of the reservation. Before the land became part of Cleveland Metroparks, its oldest core had been protected and treasured by a number of local personalities, all adept to the study and enjoyment of nature. Most of the reservation's facilities were constructed in the 1930's by the Works Progress Administration (WPA). Many of these facilities still stand, including Look About Lodge, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, a distinction that parallels the Chagrin River's Scenic River designation.







RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

Originally the home of the Forest City Amusement Park, the land was purchased by the City of Cleveland and enhanced with a variety of recreational amenities. In 2003, Cleveland Metroparks assumed stewardship of the park from the City and acquired additional land, which became the home of the Washington Golf Learning Center, in partnership with the First Tee of Cleveland. The golf course is America's first public golf facility to receive an Audubon International Gold certification.




RESERVATION DESCRIPTION

West Creek Reservation was formed in 2006 when Cleveland Metroparks began management of property protected by the City of Parma and the West Creek Preservation Committee. The parks harbors a diverse variety of wildlife in the park's valleys and ravines, steep forested hillsides, and natural, as well as manmade wetlands. Park amenities include picnic shelters, trails, and the Watershed Stewardship Center. The Center was developed through a partnership with the North East Ohio Regional Sewer District and West Creek Conservancy. It promotes the enhancement and protection of urban watersheds through education and outreach programs.







INITIAL PRIORITIES

1. Continue to work with West Creek Conservancy for trail connections and land protection, including additional acquisitions (Parmadale, etc)

2. Develop trailheads and amenities, including flush restrooms

3. Develop overlook deck with views to downtown

4. Continue to implement latest stormwater best management practices and demonstrate latest technology




