MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS OF THE

CLEVELAND METROPOLITAN PARK DISTRICT

JULY 19, 2018

The Board of Park Commissioners met on this date, Thursday, July 19, 2018, 8:00 a.m., at Stillwater Place located within Cleveland Metroparks Zoo, 3900 Wildlife Way, Cleveland, Ohio.

The roll call showed President Dan T. Moore, Vice President Debra K. Berry, and Vice President Bruce G. Rinker, to be present. It was determined there was a quorum. Chief Executive Officer, Brian M. Zimmerman, Chief Financial Officer, William Chorba, and Chief Legal and Ethics Officer, Rosalina M. Fini, were also in attendance.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES.

No. 18-07-090:

It was moved by Vice President Berry, seconded by Vice President Rinker and carried, to approve the minutes from the Regular Meeting of June 19, 2018, which were previously submitted to the members of the Board, and by them read.

FINANCIAL REPORT.

Chief Financial Officer, William Chorba, presented a Comparative Summary of Revenues & Expenditures 2018 vs. 2017 Year-To-Date, for the Month Ended June 30, Schedule of Accounts Receivable, Encumbrances and Investments Placed, as found on pages <u>86664</u> to <u>86672</u> and they were filed for audit.

(a) Appointment/Swearing in of Chief Ranger

(Originating Source: Brian M. Zimmerman, Chief Executive Officer)

The creation of the Cleveland Metropolitan Park District Police Department was made possible on June 14, 1920 when the Board of Park Commissioners passed Resolution #315 which called for maintaining "...general peace and order of the park." The first patrolman to be hired was Charles L. Fox. It wasn't until 1947, however, when James Hoy was hired as the department's first chief.

In the years that followed, not only have many acres of land been added to Cleveland Metroparks, the personnel for the Ranger Department has grown as well. Currently, the Park District rangers patrol more than 23,000 acres of land.

Today Katherine M. Dolan will be appointed as the Ranger Department's 11th chief. Katherine Dolan is currently serving as a Captain with the City of Cleveland Heights, Ohio. In her more than 17 years of experience in law enforcement, she has served as Patrol Officer, Detective, Drug Enforcement Administration, Sergeant, Lieutenant, and currently Captain. Katherine holds a Master of Science in Criminology from the University of Cincinnati, and a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice (*Cum Laude*) from the University of Toledo.

Cleveland Metroparks Rangers have a long history of dedication to the Park District and to Northeast Ohio. Chief Dolan is committed to the safety and security of our park visitors, and will continue to move the department forward, as first started by Chief Hoy.

(c) Authorization of Land Acquisition: Kucia Property, Bedford Reservation (±1.1 acres) (Originating Sources: Brian M. Zimmerman, Chief Executive Officer/Rosalina M. Fini, Chief Legal & Ethics Officer/Kyle G. Baker, Director of Real Estate & Senior Assistant Legal Counsel/Isaac D. Smith, Conservation Program Manager/Stephanie Kutsko, Land Protection Manager)

The Kucia Property is located at 15009 Schreiber Road in the City of Maple Heights and adjacent on two sides to Bedford Reservation at the entrance to Dunham Park (reference map, page 86677). Dunham Park consists of ± 49.9 acres of greenspace and was acquired through a long-term lease from the City of Maple Heights, approved through Board Resolution No. 18-01-010, and officially signed into effect on June 22, 2018. Dunham Park is the first park property held within the municipal boundary of Maple Heights in Cleveland Metroparks 101-year history. Cleveland Metroparks staff are currently developing a master plan for Dunham Park which will include improvements to the park entrance, picnic area, and restrooms.

Cleveland Metroparks has the opportunity to acquire the Kucia Property in fee simple title. The acquisition of the Kucia Property will buffer the newly acquired Dunham Park and provide an opportunity to create a more visible and welcoming entrance to the park from Schreiber Road. The acquisition of this 1.1-acre property will enhance the reservation by buffering the open space and parking area of Dunham Park and providing opportunities for improved stormwater management.

Kucia, for a purchase price of \$75,900 subject to the approval of the environmental assessment report and evidence of title, including exceptions to title, by the Chief Legal and Ethics Officer; further, that the Board authorize the Chief Executive Officer to execute agreements, together with supplemental instruments related thereon, if any, as deemed necessary or appropriate and in form acceptable to the Chief Legal & Ethics Officer.

(d) Authorization to Enter into Grant Agreement and Commit Matching Funds (Beecher's Brook and Jackson Field)

(Originating sources: Joseph Roszak, Chief Operating Officer/Terry Robison, Director of Natural Resources/Jennifer Grieser, Senior Natural Areas Manager – Urban Watersheds/Natalie Ronayne, Chief Development Officer/Kristen Trolio, Grants Manager)

The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency offers financial assistance under Section 319(h) of the Clean Water Act to implement projects to reduce non-point source pollutants and restore streams throughout the state. Cleveland Metroparks has submitted and received two grant awards under the FFY 2018 program for two projects in the Chagrin River watershed: 1) restoration of a segment of the mainstem of the Chagrin River at Jackson Field in South Chagrin Reservation and 2) restoration of a segment of Beecher's Brook, a headwater tributary to the Chagrin River in North Chagrin Reservation.

1) The Chagrin River flows along the eastern border of South Chagrin Reservation. The streambanks along the 500-lf-reach of the Chagrin River that flows adjacent to Jackson Field are steep and severely eroding, causing increased sediment loads in the river and, in turn, pollution of high-quality water resources downstream of the project site. This stretch of the Chagrin River has also lost access to its floodplain, further destabilizing the area and resulting in increased flashiness downstream. This project will use natural channel design and bioengineering to restore ±500-lf of streambank and ±0.25 acres of floodplain along this stretch of the Chagrin River. 2) Along the ±350-lf reach of Beecher's Brook located adjacent to the Wilson Mills Trailhead in North Chagrin Reservation, the streambanks are also steep and severely eroding, again causing increased sediment loads in the river and pollution of high-quality water resources downstream of the project site. See map on page 86679 for project location. This project will use natural channel design and bioengineering to restore ±350-lf of streambank along this stretch of stream. This project will also remove a manmade drop structure at this location and will install a fish ramp, or similar structure. This drop structure acts as a barrier to fish passage evidenced by Cleveland Metroparks past fish sampling efforts in this stretch of stream. To further contribute to the health of this stream, this project will remove the existing 12 ft box culvert at this location and replace with a 22 ft buried-bottom culvert.

It was moved by Vice President Berry, seconded by Vice President Rinker and carried, to authorize the Chief Executive Officer to enter into a grant agreement with the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency for ±\$410,238; to commit ±\$273,492 from Cleveland Metroparks in the form of cash and in-kind staff contributions as match dollars for the project; that the Board authorize the Chief Executive Officer to enter into agreement and execute any other documents as may be required to complete the projects; form of document(s) to be approved by Chief Legal and Ethics Officer.

(e) Authorization to Enter into Grant Agreement and Commit Match Funds (Wildlife Conservation Society Climate Adaptation Fund)

(Originating Sources: Joseph Roszak, Chief Operating Officer/Terry Robison, PhD, Director of Natural Resources/Constance Hausman, PhD, Plant and Restoration Ecologist/Kristen Trolio, Grants Manager)

Chagrin River Watershed Partners, Inc. (CRWP) received an award from the Wildlife Conservation Society Climate Adaptation Fund to enhance the health of forests draining to high-quality streams in the Chagrin and lower Grand River watersheds. Funded by the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation, the goal of the Climate Adaptation Fund is to help species, ecosystems, and human communities adapt to climate change. One of 12 projects funded nationwide, the \$181,152 award will be matched with \$184,123 in cash and in-kind services to maintain and enhance the benefits that healthy forests and streams provide.

Forests in northeast Ohio provide many important values to communities including scenic beauty, recreation, stormwater management and flood control, and cleaner air and water. However, climate change may alter our forest ecosystems and interact with and intensify many other stressors including deer browse, pests, pathogens, and invasive species. These stressors are projected to continue intensifying in the future, altering forests as we know them. The project partners will develop and use forest management

techniques focusing on enhancing native species regeneration and diversity, promoting structural complexity, and controlling invasive species to mitigate the effects of climate change and other stressors on forest ecosystems. Stream and forest assessments will be conducted as part of a long-term monitoring effort and the data will be used to adapt management approaches for optimal resiliency. Detailed monitoring data will be shared, and outreach efforts will include workshops, field-based training, and video explaining healthy forests and the climate threats that affect them.

Project partners and local funders include Cleveland Metroparks, Holden Forests & Gardens, Lake Metroparks, Geauga Park District, Lake County Soil and Water Conservation District, Lake County Stormwater Management Department, Western Reserve Land Conservancy Dominion watershed mini-grant program, Village of Gates Mills, Village of Moreland Hills, Think Media Studios, Old Woman Creek National Estuarine Research Reserve, Lake Erie Allegheny Partnership for Biodiversity, Cleveland Museum of Natural History Trout Club, and Ohio Central Basin Steelheaders.

Cleveland Metroparks efforts include:

- conducting forest assessment and management activities at targeted sites in North and South Chagrin reservations;
 - sharing data on field assessments prior to and post management activities;
 - participating in meetings, outreach, and project reporting requirements.

Cleveland Metroparks share of the project costs are as follows:

(f) Olmsted Historical Society – Frostville Museum Lease Extension (Originating Source: Joseph V. Roszak, Chief Operating Officer)

Founded in 1953, Cleveland Metroparks affiliate Olmsted Historical Society (OHS) operates a living history museum in Rocky River Reservation. Park visitors learn about 19th century township history and enjoy special events such as a weekly farmer's market, historical reenactments and holiday celebrations. OHS has long planned a schoolhouse for their re-created village and, after raising the match money, they received an Ohio Facilities Construction Commission Community Grant for \$50,000 to complete construction of a historic one-room schoolhouse at Frostville Museum in Rocky River Reservation. Cleveland Metroparks wishes to support the grant requirements by extending the affiliate agreement to 10 years from construction completion, April 30, 2029. The schoolhouse will allow OHS to expand their curriculum and offer an authentic 19th century classroom experience to local children on field trips to the museum.

(g) Authorization to Enter into Contract for Horseback Riding Event Center Concession (Originating Sources: Brian M. Zimmerman, Chief Executive Officer/Rosalina M. Fini, Chief Legal & Ethics Officer/Joseph V. Roszak, Chief Operating Officer/Katie McVoy, Assistant Legal Counsel)

Background

The Brecksville Stables occupy a portion of Brecksville Reservation located at 11921 Parkview Road in the City of Brecksville. Between 2010 and 2016, two concessionaires – Brecksville Stables, Inc. and Slosar Properties, LLC, operated Brecksville Stables as a horse boarding facility. Cleveland Metroparks is interested in pursuing a different use of Brecksville Stables than boarding.

Dressage is a type of horseback riding where horse and rider are expected to perform from memory a series of predetermined moves which require significant training and skill. Dressage events typically take place in an arena in which the horse and rider perform and judges rate the performance. At its highest level, dressage is an Olympic sport, but many dressage organizations provide opportunities for riders of all skill levels.

ACTION ITEMS (cont.)

Classical Attraction Dressage Society ("CADS") is this type of dressage society concessionaire – a non-profit organization whose goal is to promote the advancement and sport of dressage in Northeast Ohio, as well as providing horsemanship education for riders of all ages, experience and skill levels.

Proposed CADS Concession/Management Agreement

Cleveland Metroparks would like to enter into an agreement with CADS for a pilot concession/management program to operate Brecksville Stables as a horseback riding event center, with a focus on dressage.

Under the agreement, CADS will occupy the Brecksville Stables, including using two of the stable barns, offices and arena, two fenced outdoor paddocks, outside arena, and equipment barn. Cleveland Metroparks and CADS will have shared use of certain overflow parking and a paved turn-around located around the stables. Cleveland Metroparks will maintain control of the paved parking area near the stables and all bridle trails in the area. CADS welcomes continued use of all areas surrounding Brecksville Stables by Cleveland Metroparks visitors, including horseback riders.

No boarding will take place at Brecksville Stables. Instead, under the agreement, CADS will hold between thirty-six to forty-two events per year, including summer and winter dressage shows, dressage clinics, organized trail rides, extreme trail challenges (which will take place inside either the indoor or outdoor arena), and youth summer camps. The public will be welcome to participate in all CADS programs, whether as participants or spectators.

The term of the agreement shall be from August 1, 2018 through July 31, 2021. CADS shall pay to Cleveland Metroparks a fee of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) per year for each of the three years of the agreement.

The agreement will be entered into a form approved by Cleveland Metroparks Chief Legal and Ethics Officer.

(h) Professional Services Agreement – RFQ No. 6357: RainForest Facility Improvement Assessment – Cleveland Metroparks Zoo

(Originating Sources: Sean E. McDermott, P.E., Chief Planning and Design Officer/Christopher W. Kuhar, Ph.D., Zoo Executive Director/Christopher Widdowson, Architect)

Background:

On June 1, 2018 Cleveland Metroparks issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ No. 6357) for professional design services and invited qualified design professionals to submit their qualifications relative to the performance of a facility improvement assessment for the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo RainForest. The RainForest remains one of the most popular exhibits among those at the Zoo and houses over 10,000 plants and 600 animals. Opened to much acclaim in 1992, the RainForest has proven a destination for families and tourists in its unique two-acre, two-level habitat. The operation and use of the RainForest relies upon a unique and complex HVAC system that is responsible for maintaining high minimum temperatures with high relative humidity. Furthermore, the second level features nose to nose views of Bornean Orangutans in an expansive space capped with a landmark geodesic dome.

In order to properly plan for future needs, staff has prepared the RFQ for a qualified firm to perform a holistic condition assessment of the RainForest. The assessment will analyze the condition of all major building systems and components, with a concentration on the HVAC system and geodesic dome. Once complete, the assessment can inform decisions on the needs and priorities related to maintenance and upgrades at the RainForest.

RFQ Response and Analysis:

Eight (8) firms interested in providing such services responded to RFQ No. 6357. Qualifications were reviewed by a review panel of Cleveland Metroparks staff, including Sean McDermott, Andy Simons, Christopher Widdowson and Christopher Lowe.

Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code section 153.69 the top three (3) firms were ranked in order of most qualified. Wiss, Janey, Elstner Associates, Inc. ("Wiss Janey") has been identified as the most qualified. Wiss Janey's team includes Van Auken Akins (architect), Scheeser Buckley Mayfield (mechanical engineers), Lerch Bates (elevator consultant), Regency Construction (cost estimating), EA Group (environmental). Wiss Janey's history of work includes extensive

experience with building envelope and infrastructure evaluation and their team meets the needs for all other components of the assessment. Following the top ranking of Wiss Janey, a proposal for the desired services was requested.

Proposal Analysis:

A proposal was requested from Wiss Janey to conduct a facility condition assessment to evaluate the physical condition and anticipated life expectancy of building systems and assemblies, and develop a list of proposed renovation and replacement items for the building exterior, building interiors, life safety and health standards, barrier-free accessibility, building upgrades and improvements, MEP, fire protection systems, and security systems within the RainForest. The facility assessment will consist of document reviews, interviews with Cleveland Metroparks Zoo personnel, field investigations, a report of findings with an opinion of probable construction cost. The tasks associated with the current scope, which are to be performed for a lump sum fee of \$141,600, are as follows:

- Facility Assessment and Review
 - o Exterior Building Assessment
 - o Interior Building Assessment
 - House Boiler Assessment
 - o Building Utility and Operations Systems Assessment
 - o Building Security Assessment
 - o Building Life Safety Review and Health Hazards
 - o Building Energy Evaluation
 - o Building Upgrade Analysis
 - Construction Cost Estimating
 - Water Infiltration Testing
 - o Infrared Thermographic Survey of Low-Slope Roofing
 - o Temperature and Relative Humidity Monitoring
 - o Close-Range Assessment at Atrium Areas
- Progress and Final Scoping Meetings
- Report of Findings

During the performance of the scope of work additional supplemental services may be identified including but not limited to intensive building envelope testing, intensive leak detection testing, temperature and humidity monitoring, exploratory openings, material, geotechnical or environmental testing, close-up inspections utilizing ropes or scaffolding, intensive electrical systems analysis and/or physical MEP equipment testing. If these, or other, additional services are necessary they will be added to the contract following the Cleveland Metroparks procurement procedures.

(i) RFP #5968: Authorization for Camel Ride Operation Contract Extension at Cleveland Metroparks Zoo

(Originating Source: Christopher Kuhar, Executive Director, Cleveland Metroparks Zoo)

Background

The Australian Adventure area of Cleveland Metroparks Zoo contains an arena that allows for camel rides. These rides not only provide a revenue opportunity, netting approximately \$60,000 for Cleveland Metroparks on an annual basis, but they are an opportunity for guests to get close to animals to make an inspiring connection. A three-year contract for camel ride operations was awarded to JK Animal Adventures in 2014 with the opportunity for the Board to renew the contract for three additional years (RFP#5968). In this contract, JK Animal Adventures operates the ride and receives 60% of the revenue while Cleveland Metroparks receives 40% of the revenue. This contract was extended for one year on March 13, 2018 and will expire March 12, 2019.

Proposal

Cleveland Metroparks Zoo requests to extend this contract for one additional year through March 12, 2020. This would be the third year of the three-year extension authorized in the original Action Item. The terms of the contract would remain consistent with the 2018 contract extension.

The original contract obligates Images Everywhere to pay an annual commission of \$100,000 or 25% of sales, whichever is greater. Upon implementation of the Action Item, contract and construction delays have prevented a full season of operation in Year 1. The parties conferred and determined that a minimum remittance of \$70,000 in 2018 is warranted. Upon Board Approval, Images Everywhere will be responsible for a commission of \$70,000 or 25% of sales, whichever is greater, in 2018 and a commission of \$100,000 or 25% of sales, which is greater, in the remaining years of the contract.

Cleveland Metroparks Park Operations Department has taken inventory and condition assessments of degraded asphalt all-purpose trail throughout the Park District. Based on those assessments, two sections of trail were identified that warrant a new 1-1/2" thick asphalt surface course. This site improvement project includes the resurfacing and paving of approximately 49,394 square yards (8.80 miles) total of existing asphalt all-purpose trail throughout Acacia and Rocky River Reservations.

The scope of work includes the resurfacing of the following asphalt all-purpose trails:

1. Acacia Trail Resurfacing - Acacia Reservation

1-1/2" asphalt overlay of approximately 17,786 square yards (3.40 miles) of existing all-purpose trail pavement throughout Acacia Reservation. Asphalt transition grinding of 360 square yards and 1,790 square yards of full depth asphalt pavement trail construction prior to the asphalt overlay. In addition, 150 square yards of existing pavement removal with topsoil, seeding, and mulching restoration.

2. Rocky River Trail Resurfacing - Rocky River Reservation

1-1/2" asphalt overlay of approximately 31,609 square yards (5.40 miles) of existing all-purpose trail pavement on the northern half of Rocky River Reservation from Detroit Road to Puritas Avenue. Asphalt transition grinding of 651 square yards and 56 square yards of full depth asphalt pavement trail removal and replacement prior to the asphalt overlay. In addition, 2 manhole castings adjusted to grade and trail pavement markings replaced in-kind.

Background

Cleveland Metroparks implemented Yellow Dog software in 2015. Yellow Dog provides an inventory management software system for hospitability and retail markets. Yellow Dog's software system assists Cleveland Metroparks staff by providing a successful inventory management system to achieve operational and established protocols when operating both Food and Beverage ("F&B") and/or Retail.

Yellow Dog is the only provider of inventory management software designed to work with Cleveland Metroparks' Oracle/Micros point of sale terminals. The Oracle/Micros point of sale terminals are used by all retail and F&B locations (under Park Operations) throughout Cleveland Metroparks.

Currently, the Yellow Dog system is approximately \pm \$19,000 per year. This cost may fluctuate year to year depending on several factors which include:

- 1. Contractual terms: monthly costs are reduced after 36 months of service per location;
- 2. Adding and removing services in various locations;
- 3. Locations may be augmented with new inventory selections or technologies. Cleveland Metroparks staff evaluates each location on a semi-annual basis which may cause a change in monthly charges.

Cleveland Metroparks recommends adding a yearly **allowance of \$6,000** due to the potential fluctuations as indicated above. Ultimately, bringing the total estimated **spend per year at** \pm **\$25,000** (5 years x \$25,000 = \$125,000).

The Director of Procurement has designated Central Nebraska Packing as a sole source for zoo meat supply due to product consistency in both nutritional guarantees and textures. As well, Central Nebraska provides more reliable scheduling and ordering efficiency. Although different companies may have similar base ingredients there are differences in composition. These differences would require an extensive transition time for many species with no guarantees of success. Experimental usage from alternate companies in the past consistently delivered an inferior product with greater amounts of sinew due to the differences in the way Central Nebraska processes their meats. In short, testing of competitive product consistently produced the Central Nebraska product as consistent and superior, according to zoo veterinarian staff.

Central Nebraska Packing also has a proven track record of product availability. Most of Cleveland Metroparks Zoo's needs are horse meat-based products. A couple of the other potential vendors have processing plants outside of the United States where regulations are not as strict. Central Nebraska's facilities are in the United States meaning the regulations on processing horse meat are substantial and heavily enforced to insure health and safety standards are being met.

Estimated expenditures are based on current animal population and consumption. Animal population may vary throughout the contract period.

Pursuant to Cleveland Metroparks By-Laws, Article 5 (Procurement), Section 4 (b) and (c), as revised and approved by the Board of Park Commissioners on January 10, 2013, "...the CEO is not authorized to enter into any change orders to construction contracts, without prior approval of the Board in each instance, except that the CEO is authorized to enter into change orders to construction contracts, without prior approval of the Board in each instance, where the additional cost is less than THE LESSER OF: (i) \$50,000, or (ii) ten percent (10%) of the cost of the contract. Each change order by the CEO under this Article shall be reported to the Board at the next meeting of the Board following the execution of said change order."

(c). "Amendment to Professional Service Contract. INFORMATION/BRIEFING ITEMS/POLICY.

a. Chief Executive Officer's Employee Guests

(Originating Source: Brian M. Zimmerman, Chief Executive Officer)

Jeffrey S. Tolman, External Communications Coordinator

Jeffrey Tolman began his career at Cleveland Metroparks in August 2017. Jeff previously served as a spokesperson and media contact for the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA), the nation's second largest transit agency. While at CTA he gained significant experience and skills in marketing and communications including crisis communications, speechwriting, event planning and social media strategy. Jeff was responsible for developing marketing and communications packages for campaigns, initiatives, and major capital projects, including the \$203 million-dollar Wilson Station Reconstruction Project. Jeff also helped manage marketing initiatives and assisted with crisis communications on social media that included a Twitter account with nearly 200,000

followers. Prior to working for CTA, Jeff worked under former Illinois Governor Pat Quinn assisting with media relations, media events, social media accounts, and writing and editing press releases. Jeff holds a Master of Arts, *magna cum laude* from DePaul University in Chicago, Illinois, and a Bachelor of Science in Communications, *cum laude* from Ohio University.

b. Bonnie Park Ecological Restoration and Site Improvement Project – Mill Stream Run Reservation

(Originating Sources, Sean E. McDermott, P.E., Chief Planning and Design Officer/Tammy Oliver, Director of Project Development/Terry Robison, Director of Natural Resources)

Cleveland Metroparks has received funding from the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency Water Resource Restoration Sponsor Program for restoration at Bonnie Park to improve water quality in East Branch Rocky River and to restore adjacent areas within the park. The conceptual designs, performed by Cleveland Metroparks and EnviroScience, call for partial or complete removal of the Bonnie Park dam and associated floodplain and stream restoration. This project will reverse stream impairments and establish a foundation for ecological recovery, including removal of impervious surfaces, modification of existing stormwater infrastructure, wetland restoration and reforestation. Cleveland Metroparks will also seek to provide a natural surface walking trail, overlook structure to enhance guest experience and fishing opportunities at Bonnie Park. Cleveland Metroparks staff is acting as the criteria architect on the project.

Requests for Qualifications and Proposals have been issued to Design-Build firms to design and construct these improvements. Staff will provide a background of the project to the Board and then return subsequently to provide a recommendation of a Design-Builder for the Bonnie Park Ecological Restoration and Site Improvement Project and correlating Guaranteed Maximum Price in the coming months.

c. Conservation Planning - West Virginia White Butterfly – Hinckley Reservation (Originating Sources: Sean E. McDermott, P.E., Chief Planning and Design Officer, Nidia Arguedas, PhD, Conservation Planner)

A species of concern for the Lake Erie-Allegheny Partnership for Biodiversity (LEAP) and found in Cleveland Metroparks only in the Hinckley Reservation, the West Virginia White butterfly flies the rich woodlands the few warm, sunny days of early spring. Following its short awakening, it then "disappears" into the undergrowth.

INFORMATION/BRIEFING ITEMS/POLICY (cont.)

A flagstone species of vulnerability for the highest quality beech maple forests, protection of this little butterfly in Cleveland Metroparks requires many partners including observations by Outdoor Experiences, hours of work by Watershed Stewardship Center volunteers, carefully executed invasive plant control by Natural Resources, and mapping and tracking of the butterfly by Planning and Design GIS (Geographic Information Systems) staff for regional coordination of these efforts with LEAP.

d. Notice of Bidding – Scenic Park Bridge Deck Overlay – Rocky River Reservation (Originating Sources: Sean E. McDermott, P.E., Chief Planning and Design Officer, John C. Kilgore, P.E., Manager of Facilities Engineering)

The Scenic Park Bridge (RRBRG005) was originally constructed in 1959 and underwent a major rehabilitation in 1997. The bridge, which is one of the forty-six (46) ODOT rated vehicular bridges in the Park District, is critical to Valley Parkway and the Emerald Necklace system as it sits at the northern gateway to the Rocky River Reservation. The bridge, which crosses the Rocky River, also serves as the only access point for the City of Lakewood to access their Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Annual bridge inspections have demonstrated the need for the replacement of the bridge deck overlay, which consists of a 1-1/4" thick micro-silica concrete material. Staff will provide a background on the bridge and the proposed work to take place.

e. Cleveland Metroparks Pilot Health Intervention Overview

(Originating Sources: Trishna Desai, Info Tech Business Analyst/Anthony Joy, Chief Information Officer)

In partnership with Kent State University, a pilot research intervention assessing the health benefits of exercising in green vs. urban spaces launches in late June of 2018. Individuals enrolled in the MetroHealth STRIDES weight-loss program will participate in 8 weekly walking sessions in reservations and urban sidewalks in the Broadway and Strongsville areas. Blood pressure, mood, heart rate, salivary cortisol, and self-esteem will be measured before and after each session and compared between the groups to determine any significant health impacts.

f. Virtual Reality

(Anthony Joy, Joy, Chief Information Officer/Brandon Miller, Interpretive Technology Technician)

To continue its mission of conservation, education, and recreation, Cleveland Metroparks seeks to provide virtual and mixed reality experiences to people who are unable to visit our parks or to provide additional educational opportunities to its guests. To accomplish this goal, Cleveland Metroparks has identified specific technology to enable instructor-guided and self-guided virtual reality experiences.

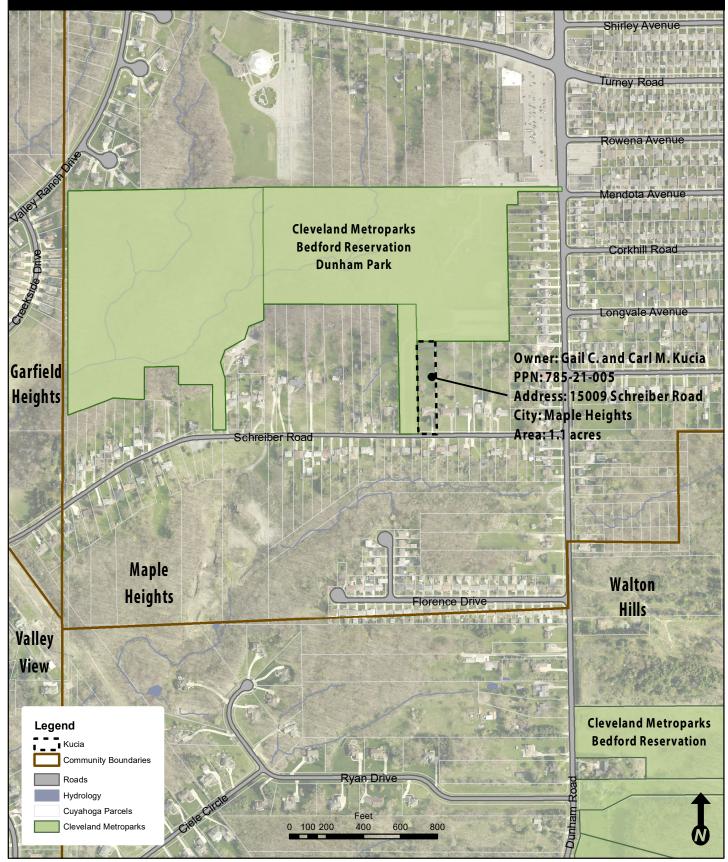
